### **Ram Portal Launch Update**

#### Timeline:

During the week of March 4<sup>th</sup> all students and faculty will be able to log into RamPortal to review the fall 2024 class schedule and begin preparing for registration. When the system is available, students and faculty will receive an email with instructions on how to log in.

### Preparing:

The best way to prepare for RamPortal is to attend a training session. In the weeks ahead we have additional sessions for faculty advisors, and sessions for chairs/graduate coordinators/academic department admins. Please register for sessions on the **FAST Training site.** 

Supporting fall 24 registration will look different in RamPortal. Our **Registration website** provides more information about the timeline for registration. Below is a quick guide on what tools you can plan to use.

**Note:** Advisors and students will be utilizing the myWCU Degree Progress Report (DPR) to see their degree requirements during the fall 24 registration period. WCU has moved the launch (aka "go-live") of the new RamPortal Degree Audit tool until Summer 2024 to allow us to ensure the accuracy of the degree requirements.

#### Support:

We recognize that it will take time for students, faculty, and staff to learn the new RamPortal system. We're here to support everyone in the transition. Here are some ways to connect with support during March.

### WCU Students Take Awards at Kennedy Center at American College Regional Theater Festival

Students in West Chester University's Department of Theatre and Dance displayed talent and skill and won awards at the



Kennedy Center American College Theatre Festival (KCACTF, Region 2) in Downtown Pittsburgh.

KCACTF Region 2 attracts theatre students and faculty from colleges and universities in six Mid-Atlantic states for four days of theatre training and competition. The Region's Leadership, with support from the Pittsburgh Playhouse of Point Park University, the August Wilson African American Cultural Center, and The Pittsburgh Cultural Trust, enabled the invitation of 115 college and university theatre programs to present and receive feedback on student work. Of the 700 students in attendance, 25 were from West

Chester University. They were joined by two faculty members from the department.

West Chester University students received the following commendations at the festival:

- Raven Burckhalter was invited to perform in the KCACTF 2024 Cabaret. It was also announced that Burckhalter will be working in a professional production of Once on this Island at Philadelphia's Arden Theatre Company this Spring.
- Ania Hawkins-Williams received a Civic Dramaturgy commendation for work on Me, War and Toy Grenade
- Eli McBride received a Creative Audience Engagement Commendation for Dramaturgical work on Kiss Me Kate.
- Victoria Naftel was presented the Randy Lutz Allied Design and Technology Award, Regional 2 for Charlotte's Web puppets. She won a trip to Seattle, Washington, to present at the United States Institute of Theatre Technology this spring.
- DJ Ty Tansey was featured at the Late-Night Dance Party
- Isabella Yackanicz was a Musical Theatre Initiative (MTI) Finalist and received a one-on-one coaching session.
- Griffen Anderson, Myra Kelley, and Victoria Naftel received First Place in the Timed Props Event as part of the Technical Olympics.

West Chester University students attended workshops in resume development, cold readings, dance, design, and more. They also attended luncheons, participated in Technical Olympics, attended design exhibit presentations, entered competitions, and performed.

# 150 Employers Court WCU Students at 2024 Job Fair: PA Auditor General Recognized WCU Student as First Graduate of Intern2Hire Program

With the sound of feet hitting the ground running, the spring job-hunting and internship-mining season has officially begun for college students; three-quarters of employers say the overall job market is favorable for graduates of the Class of 2024. This is great news for 1,000+ West Chester University (WCU) students who pounded the pavement on February 28 at an oncampus job and internship fair that brought 150 employers to the University's Student Recreation Center. Employers in attendance ranged from nonprofits and government agencies to small, mid-size, and large corporations. WCU's Twardowski Career Development Center organizes the University's Job and Internship Fair.

As the road to successful employment is often paved with a rewarding internship, Pennsylvania Auditor General Timothy L. DeFoor joined President Christopher Fiorentino and Twardowski Career Development Center Director Jennifer Rossi Long in recognizing Francisco Molina, a 2023 WCU alumnus and the first graduate of the Intern-to-Hire Program.

The fair provided the landscape for productive student-employer engagement. By speaking oneon-one with employers, students are determined to land job and internship interviews for later dates.

Exactly what are employers looking for these days? Rossi Long shares that employers are looking for employees who have command of emotional intelligence. "In today's technologically-advanced, complex job markets, employers want their employees to have skills that cannot be replaced by Artificial Intelligence. In addition to solid academic backgrounds, they need employees who bring skills that are inherently human — interpersonal communication, creativity, problem solving, and empathy," she says. There is also a give-and-take that appears to be much more prevalent in today's job market. In addition to making positive connections with employers, many students are equally as interested in making sure potential employers' values match their own and that employees' best interests are top of mind.

Much is currently being done by those at WCU's Twardowski Career Development Center to help students become comfortable with the process of interviewing. One of the most popular tools has been the use of the "Big Interview," where students are able to do a mock interview on their own by recording an interview and playing it back to hear what they said, how they said it, as well as watch the non-verbal gestures used. Some WCU professors are even incorporating "Big Interview" in their classrooms by choosing sets of questions specific to their subject areas. "This tool is proving to be a great way to integrate career-readiness in the classroom," says Rossi Long. "The platform puts the power of the interview in the hands of the student whenever the student needs to access it the most."

The fair is intentional. It has been designed to provide teachable moments to students

at *every* stage of their job or internship hunt. In fact, the fair even acts as a training ground for job-hunting voyeurs or "first-timers," students who will one day be pounding-the-pavement themselves for jobs or internships. While students interact with employers, graduate assistants will escort some job-hunting newbies who will watch intently as participant-observers and learn how one approaches an employer, what one says to an employer, how one dresses, and more.

The Class of 2024 has much to be excited about. According to the National Association of Colleges and Employers, "Salary stability is evident as slightly more than 43% of employers plan to increase starting salaries to Class of 2024 bachelor's degree graduates, and nearly all remaining employers anticipate keeping salaries at last year's levels."

### The Society of WCU Establishes Two New Awards

The Society of West Chester University has established two new awards that are now presented



annually at the Martin Luther King, Jr., Brunch each January: the Larry Dowdy Community Service Award and the Student Service Leadership Award. The Society, which organizes and

hosts the brunch, is an organization of University faculty, staff, and administrators who embrace the spirit of Frederick Douglass' commitment to social consciousness and inclusiveness.

In recognition of his extensive service to the University, Lawrence A. Dowdy '73 (who was out of town and unable to attend the brunch) was named the inaugural recipient of the Larry Dowdy Community Service Award.

Dowdy completed his undergraduate degree at what was then at West Chester State College in 1973, becoming a residence hall director and assistant director of the Act 101 Program following his graduation.

In 1976 he began working for Cheyney University, serving in several roles that included dean of men, dean for student services, and Affirmative Action officer. He completed his master's degree in counselor education during this time.

Dowdy returned to his alma mater in 1983 as the Affirmative Action officer, later becoming special assistant to the president, the executive assistant to the president, and government relations officer. He was named executive deputy to the president and governmental relations officer in 1999, the position he held until his retirement in 2014. Dowdy was lauded for mentoring both students and staff members. He was chair of the Campus Climate Intervention Team, the Board of Governors Scholarship Committee, and the Martin Luther King, Jr., Celebration Committee.

Dowdy has been the recipient of numerous awards and accolades, including the Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., Humanitarian Award, the Mary Baltimore Award from the Pennsylvania Black Conference on Higher Education, the President's Award for Philanthropy, and the WCU Presidential Medallion for Service. The Dowdy Multicultural Center is named in his honor.

The first annual Society Student Service Leadership Award was presented to Empower Communities Around You (ECAY). ECAY is a multicultural community service organization whose mission is to uplift, impact, and empower those within our community through meaningful service opportunities in the tri-state area, special programs, and collaborative events on campus. They pride themselves on being able to create a safe space for students to give them a voice and allow them to create a great college experience for themselves.

The Society annually raises money for scholarship funds in an effort to increase the economic options available to the student body. It seeks, by the example of Douglass, to promote an intellectual standard that is not only grounded in excellence, but also profoundly rooted in the public mission of higher education. Current academic year officers are Andria Young, president; Stephanie Reid, vice president; Tiffany Jones, treasurer; and Ronda Taylor, secretary.
