WCU Receives PA Hunger Free Campus Grant

The Governor's Office and the Pennsylvania Department of Education have announced that West Chester University has been selected to receive



state grant funding in the amount of \$60,000 from the 2023-2024 PA Hunger-Free Campus grant, as part of the Governor's PA Hunger-Free Campus program. Now in its second year, the grant is designed to combat student hunger at universities, colleges, and private licensed schools throughout the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. Once again, West Chester University is one of 30 institutions of higher education and private licensed schools in Pennsylvania selected to receive the much-needed funding. As a member of the PA Hunger-Free Campus grant's first cohort of awardees in January of 2023, the University was awarded \$54,399. Director of the Center for Civic Engagement & Social Impact Rita Patel Eng submitted the application for this year's grant on behalf of the Center, which houses the West Chester University Resource Pantry.

"We are deeply grateful to Governor Shapiro and the Pennsylvania Department of Education for providing the necessary funding to help West Chester University reach out to an increasing number of students, so they are not in the position of choosing between buying a textbook, a meal or even basic essentials if they do not have the means to do so," said West Chester University President Chris Fiorentino. "West Chester University is committed to the success of all of its students at all phases of their educational journeys. We are proud that so many of our students are crossing the finish line to graduate because many are willing to provide the resources needed to fuel their success."

Since its inception in 2016, the West Chester University Resource Pantry has been

actively supporting student success by minimizing food and basic need insecurity while preparing students for life after graduation. The Pantry, which is open to all undergraduate and graduate students registered at the University regardless of need level, provides fresh food from the University's South Campus and Tanglewood Gardens. The Pantry also features a room designated to providing toiletries and school supplies, a welcoming intake space for students, and even an area where students can enroll in government benefits called the Benefits Hub. The Resource Pantry is supported by the Office of Financial Aid, the University's civically-engaged WCU student organizations, as well as very generous donors through the WCU Foundation.

Funds from the generous 2023-2024 grant will be used by the Center to expand the Resource Pantry's capacity to serve West Chester University students experiencing food insecurity, especially those who are at the highest risk, through additional programs and infrastructure, on the University's main campus as well as at the Philadelphia location. In keeping with this comprehensive plan, the Center will expand pantry services available for students on its West Chester campus through online ordering; increase options for students to access food during evening and weekend hours through online order pickup via locker access; increase access to healthy and allergy-friendly food; support the expansion of the Resource Pantry at the Philadelphia location; build upon resources to support students in applying for benefits through the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP); and increase students' access to off-campus resources.

"This fall 2023, the WCU Resource Pantry served the highest number of students it has ever served since the pantry started in 2016. The need is unprecedented as we operate on the generosity of donors from our community of faculty, staff, students, alumni, countless community partners, and grants like the PA Hunger-Free Campus Grant," says Patel-Eng."

WCU Introduces "Blue" Online Student Evaluation Platform

Spring 2024 will be the first semester that students will complete Student Rating of Instructor Surveys (SRIS) ratings of instruction online using an online platform called "Blue." In Fall 2023, Institutional Research ran the Blue pilot, with the participation of faculty who were not in the evaluation process, to ensure that the system and workflow were working appropriately and to determine whether online SRIS would yield a viable response rate. With the success of that pilot, we are confident that we are ready for the launch this semester. All student rating of faculty surveys—SRIS, DE SRIS, STSAF (for student teaching sections), and NCQ (for nursing clinical sections)—will be administered through Blue.

None of the student evaluation instruments have changed. The selection of an instrument is governed by the faculty collective bargaining agreement, and there have been no new instruments approved according to the process laid out in the CBA. Only the delivery method has changed, and approval for this change came in 2022 from APSCUF's Department Representatives Council, in accordance with the WCU APSCUF Chapter bylaws.

Departments will continue to "order" SRIS from Institutional Research following the same process in SharePoint that was used for the paper SRIS. When the SRIS administration opens for students, faculty will be notified via email. Faculty will be able to track response rates in D2L and through a dashboard in Blue, and they will be able to encourage their students to compete the SRIS. In addition, students will get reminders to fill out SRIS via D2L. These methods were proven effective in getting the needed response rates in the Fall 2023 pilot. After grades are in, faculty will be able to return to the Blue dashboard to retrieve their SRIS results reports. The reports, downloadable as PDFs, have been designed to look as close to identical to the reports from the paper SRIS as possible. Just as with the paper SRIS, open-ended question results will be available through the dashboard, and only accessible to the faculty member.

Getting to this point is a significant accomplishment that will reduce faculty workload involved in SRIS administration and benefit the environment through the reduction of the use of paper. We would like to thank the faculty and staff who put in countless hours selecting a vendor for online delivery of SRIS and designing and running the Fall 2023 pilot. WCU Celebrates 30th Anniversary of MLK Brunch

The multi-day commemoration highlighted the 30th anniversary for the University's Martin Luther King, Jr., Brunch, which has been expanded over the years beyond the actual brunch celebration to include other events, service projects, and special guests. The brunch is organized and hosted by the Society of WCU, formerly WCU's Frederick Douglass Society.

This year, Ndaba Mandela, author of Going to the

Mountain: Life Lessons from My Grandfather, Nelson Mandela, presented a free virtual keynote



address on January 26.

Ndaba carries on his grandfather's humanitarian mission as co-founder and chairman of the Mandela Institute for Humanity, where he lifts up the next generation of African leaders and fights for the end of HIV/AIDS. He was named one of the "28 Men of Change" by BET (Black Entertainment Television) and is featured in their International Emmy-nominated 2023 documentary series The Mandela Project, which centers on Nelson Mandela's legacy.

The brunch program celebrated Dr. King's civil rights work and promotion of nonviolent struggle for racial justice. WCU alumni who exemplify Dr. King's legacy were recognized at the brunch with the annual Drum Major for Justice Awards.

Other awards presented during the brunch included the **Civility Award** and, new this year, a community service award named for former Executive Deputy to the President Lawrence A. Dowdy '79 and the Society's **Student Service Leadership Award**. This year's packed program also included a history of the event presented by Valerie Dudley, one of the past presidents of WCU's Frederick Douglass Society and now director of Multicultural Education & Training at Temple University.

Andria Young, interim executive associate in the Office of the Vice President of Student Affairs and president of the Society, remarked on the anniversary of the brunch, saying, "As I reflect on Dr. King's legacy, though there have been some changes, ... there is so much that still needs to be done. It is my sincere hope as the community engages in the various events of the week, that they will do so genuinely mindful of Rev. Dr. King's commitment to mercy, justice, and peace; that something said or done will communicate the importance of his legacy; and that it will motivate a move from complacency to consistent and directed activism "until justice rolls down like water and righteousness like a mighty stream."*

Service has been part of the University's commemoration of Dr. King's legacy from the beginning. This year, two community service projects brought the campus community together to spruce up Bayard Rustin Park (corner of Rosedale Avenue and South Walnut Street), named for the civil rights activist and West Chester native, and to inspect and clean toys from the St. Agnes Day Room. In addition, there was a student panel entitled "Through Our Eyes."

The Society of WCU is an organization of University faculty, staff, and administrators who embrace the spirit of Frederick Douglass' commitment to social consciousness and inclusiveness. Their programs aim to stimulate other groups on campus to enrich our multicultural climate. The MLK Brunch is one way the Society raises money for scholarship funds.

WCU Pilots Program to Foster Constructive Dialogue on Campus

WCU is partnering with a nonprofit, nonpartisan organization that provides customizable online educational resources and training modules aimed at fostering constructive dialogue on college campuses. The program, which is psychology and evidence-based, is a product of the **Constructive Dialogue Institute** (CDI). WCU Wecomes New Dean of the Colleges of the Sciences and Mathematics

We are pleased to announce the successful completion of our search for the next Dean of the College of the Sciences and Mathematics.

Dr. Jessica OShaughnessy (pronounced "O-Shocknessy") will be joining us on February 1st from Stockton University, where she currently serves as Associate Provost. She has served in a variety of leadership roles over her career, including Chair of Mathematical Sciences and Assistant Dean at Shenandoah University. She currently serves as the chair of the Mathematical Association of America Committee on Assessment. Her



current portfolio at Stockton includes the Office of Research and Sponsored Programs, the Office of Global Engagement, the Office of Assessment, and the Office of Community Engagement and Service Learning. She also serves on the institution's negotiating team with the faculty union.

Dr. O'Shaughnessy received her PhD in Mathematics and her M.Sc. in Communication Systems Theory from the National University of Ireland, Galway, and her B.A. in Mathematics from St. Mary's College in Maryland.

Condliffe Honored with Lindback Distinguished Teaching Award

At West Chester University's winter commencement in December, Simon

Condliffe, professor of economics and finance, was awarded the Lindback Distinguished Teaching Award for demonstrated excellence in teaching students.

Condliffe's teaching interests are microeconomics, managerial economics for MBA students, business statistics, research methods, and the economics of



health care. He has received awards at the University for excellence in advising and has been recognized by WCU's Honors College as an outstanding faculty member.

His research interests include health care economics, microeconomics, regional economics and the economics of gambling. He has published papers in the American Economic Review, the Municipal Finance Journal, and in the Journal of Regulatory Economics on the topics of health economics, economic development, and environmental economics, respectively. Additionally, he has published in The Review of Regional Studies, Applied Economics Letters, and the UNLV Gaming Research and Review Journal.

Condliffe earned his doctoral and master of science degrees from the University of Delaware and his undergraduate degree from the University of Humberside, England.

Since 1961, the Lindback Foundation has made grants in support of the **Lindback Distinguished Teaching Award** to colleges and universities primarily in the Greater Delaware Valley area.

Three CHS Faculty Honored at December Commencement

During December's commencement ceremonies, three faculty from West Chester University's College of Health Sciences (CHS) were recognized for their excellence in the classroom and beyond. All three honorees teach both undergraduate and graduate courses.

The **E. Riley Holman Memorial Faculty Award** was presented to Chiwoneso Tinago, associate professor of public health sciences. The award recognizes her demonstration of innovative teaching techniques that foster student creativity.

In addition to teaching public health and gerontology courses, Tinago conducts community-based health promotion and education programs and participatory research focused on improving maternal and child health outcomes in this country as well as southeast Africa. In 2018, she was awarded a Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation Round 20 Grand Challenge Explorations Grant in the amount of \$100,000 to support this work in Harare, Zimbabwe.

Tinago is also internship coordinator and faculty internship advisor for the public health program and chair of the CHS Global Health Research Team and the Global Initiatives Committee.

The **Campus Diversity Award** was jointly presented to Zeinab Baba, assistant professor of public health sciences, and Kimberly Johnson, associate professor of nutrition. The

award recognizes outstanding contributions to the spirit of diversity on campus.

Baba and Johnson developed and are co-facilitators of the CHS Diversity and Inclusion Faculty Learning Community (DIFLC), where CHS faculty participate in discussions, case studies, and readings and hear from invited speakers to support cultural competence in the development of inclusive learning environments. Launched for the fall 2020 semester, the work was supported by a WCU Innovation in Diversity and Inclusion grant. One outcome was creation of a collective document on strategies for inclusive practices. For the academic year 2023-2024, the program has been opened to all faculty and is being co-sponsored by the Teaching and Learning Center and the Office of Diversity, Equity and Inclusion.

Baba is the assessment coordinator for the MPH program. She has extensive experience managing and analyzing various healthcare datasets for pediatric and adult populations. Her quantitative and qualitative research focuses on prevention, health disparities, mental health, and perceptions of health, and particularly on the intersection of public health with other closely related fields including social work, migration, cultural anthropology, and others.

Johnson directs the Sustainable Food Systems Management concentration of the nutrition program. Her research includes social theory of food and nutrition, sustainable food systems, social determinants of health, food security, and public engagement in science and policy of food, health, and citizenship. Her work has been funded by an Allen Foundation grant.
